Dear Mr. Schuh:

At the American Medical Association's (AMA) 2016 Annual Meeting, the House of Delegates referred Resolution 108 to the Board of Trustees. Resolution 108-A-16 asks the AMA to "seek legislation/regulation which would allow a physician who has performed an initial surgical procedure, to continue to follow the patient and perform any necessary follow-up surgery, regardless of the physician's change in participation status; and (support) that any follow-up surgery performed by a physician whose participation status changed after the initial surgery was performed, be reimbursed appropriately based on their current participation status."

The Board of Trustees has referred this item to the Council on Medical Service for a report back to the House of Delegates at the 2017 Annual Meeting. The Council would welcome any additional comments or information from the Medical Society of the State of New York, the sponsor of Resolution 108-A-16. The Council plans to discuss this resolution initially at its meeting in January 2017. To assure inclusion in the agenda materials for that meeting, we would need to receive any additional comments you wish to provide by no later than Thursday, October 20, 2016.

Continued Surgical Care

Whereas, patients often require reconstructive surgery for treatment of cancers or other
 ailments which frequently may be performed in stages; and

 Whereas, staged surgery is often encountered for patients with breast cancer, requiring multiple surgeries of breast reconstruction; and

Whereas, staged reconstruction of the breast can be delayed due to chemotherapy, radiation, and other aspects of the patient's cancer care; and

Whereas, a patient's insurance plan can change during the course of their multiple staged surgery; and

Whereas, continuum of the same surgeon to perform additional stages of surgery is imperative for the medical, surgical and psychological well-being of the patient; and

Whereas, the participation status of the physician who performed the initial surgery may change prior to the second stage reconstructive surgery; and

Whereas, insurance companies may deny authorization for any additional surgeries to be performed by an out-of-network surgeon stipulating that only "in-network" physicians can be utilized; and

Whereas, any delay or denial of authorization can place an undue burden and hardship upon the patient, by requiring that they seek to obtain the services of an "in-network" physician who, in all likelihood, will be unfamiliar to them, thereby causing further emotional and psychological distress; therefore, be it

 RESOLVED, that The Medical Society of the State of New York (MSSNY) seek legislation/regulation which would allow a physician who has performed an initial surgical procedure, to continue to follow the patient and perform any necessary "follow-up"/"reconstructive" surgery, regardless of the physician's change in participation status; and be it further

RESOLVED, that any follow-up/reconstructive surgery performed by a physician whose participation status changed from when the initial surgery was performed, be reimbursed on an out-of-network basis; and be it further

RESOLVED, that MSSNY forward this resolution to the AMA for implementation on a national level.
