1) Welcome

2) Adoption of October 16, 2020 Minutes – approved

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3) Rob Kent, Esq. General Counsel, National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) – Rob Kent formerly general counsel of OASAS has been appointed General Counsel at the National Drug Control Policy by the Biden Administration. Mr. Kent indicated that most of the team was in place and that they had only just begin to work in the agency. Mr. Kent is well known to MSSNY and the committee and indicated he would like to hear the members concerns. He pointed out that the agency is part of the Executive Office of the President. Harm reductions has been listed as one of the priorities of this office. There are two bills being sponsored in Congress. One that pertains to the X review and another—would allow individuals access to Medicare benefits thirty days prior to release from incarceration. This would allow access to insurance and treatment benefits. A concern was the divide between state and federal regulations and how that would impact harm reduction. Mr. Kent encouraged the members of MSSNY to be in touch with their representatives in Washington to keep apprised of what is happening. Mr. Kent was thanked for his time.

- 4) Review and adjustment to MSSNY Marijuana policy paper the governor has placed marijuana in the budget. The committee as been asked to review the letter and add or remove anything that no longer applies.
 - The medical component should remain in the Department of Health rather than the Cannabis Medical Board.
 - Harm reduction strategy should apply to both recreational and medical marijuana.
 - The science references need to be updated they are over two years old.
 - ASAM has an updated policy that might be referenced, it doesn't however, reference any downside.
 - It shouldn't be sold to pregnant women.

- Regarding the AMA Marijuana Task Force there should be more focus on science as opposed to advocacy.
- Needs to address racial and socio-economic disparities this needs to be part of the document. The concentration of shops in the inner city will disproportionately effect the communities.

Question - Did MSSNY support decriminalization? Yes, MSSNY did.

Legalization of marijuana should not be in the state budget. The state should run the program. If the state runs the program it should help correct the concentration in disparate communities. The committee requested that Dr. Cohen give an update on the AMA Marijuana Task Force at the next meeting.

Physicians are asked to meet with their legislators on the afternoon of MSSNY's Lobby Day on March 2, 2021. Committees and physician members should reach out to their county medical societies as well, to gather support.

5) 2021 House of Delegates Sunset Review – The following policies have been forwarded to this committee for review. The committee can either reaffirm, reaffirm with modifications or sunset the policy.

- a) 20.897 Age-based Alcohol Policies Sunset
- b) 65.992 Preventing Overdose Deaths Reaffirm
- c) 65.993 Preventing Overdose Deaths "911 Good Samaritan" Reaffirm with modifications

There was discussion regarding "sunsetting" this policy. It was brought to the committee's attention that if this policy no longer existed it would prevent the committee and MSSNY from speaking on this subject to the AMA or on a national level. It was decided to reaffirm with modifications. In the justifications the reason that this committee feels it's important for this policy to stay in place will be listed in the justification portion. If the committee would like to write a new policy, it can do so and present it to the House of Delegates at the meeting in the fall.

6) NYS Budget Proposal for the merging of OMH and OASAS – The Legislature has rejected this merger in the past. There are several groups within OMH mad OASAS that are planning their budgets in anticipation of this merger. The worry is that substance abuse treatment will suffer with this merger. Also, how would this effect a sole practitioner treating substance abuse disorders? Do they have to join this organization? How will they merge the administration of these organizations? OASAS has often had non-medical execs in the past. What will physician roles be in the administration of this merger? There has, in the past been a

push to collaborate with clinical physicians. Patients with dual diagnosis will receive treatment for both. Regardless of whether you have a serious mental illness, a substance abuse disorder would not exclude a patient where it has in the past. The cultural differences between OMH and OASAS is a huge issue. Pat Clancy will look into what is going on with the merger and report back to the committee.
