have serious doubts about the morality of the study, also say that it is too late to treat the syphilis in any surviving participants.



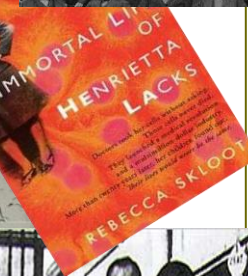
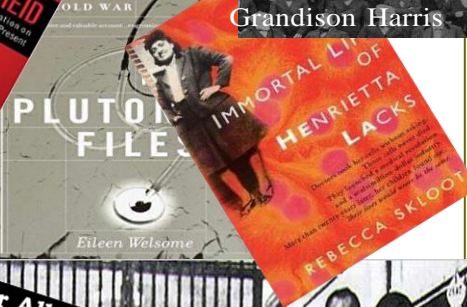

Dr. Easterling has also served as the Deputy Commissioner of the Center for Health Equity and Community Wellness (CHECW) at the Health Department. During his time as Deputy Commissioner, Dr. Easterling led the restructuring of Center for Health Equity and Community Wellness and has led the agency's equity plan in response to the COVID-19 Pandemic.



Rachel Villanueva, M.D. Dr. Villanueva earned her B.S. degree from Yale University, and her M.D. degree from Yale University School of Medicine. She completed internship and residency training at the New York Hospital. She is a board certified obstetrician/gynecologist and is a women's health expert and advocate currently affiliated with New York University Langone Medical Center. Dr. Villanueva is President Elect of the National Medical Association and Past Speaker of the House of Delegates. She is a member of the Executive Committee of the Association of Alumni in Yale Medicine.



Camille A. Clare, MD, MPH. Dr. Clare is Chair and Professor at the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology of SUNY-Downstate Health Sciences University College of Medicine and School of Public Health. She received her medical degree from the Albert Einstein College of Medicine, and completed her obstetrics and gynecology residency at the State University of New York at Buffalo. She obtained a Master of Public Health in Health Policy and Management at New York Medical College. Dr. Clare previously served as the Associate Dean of Diversity and Inclusion at New York Medical College and attending physician at New York City Health + Hospitals/Metropolitan. Dr. Clare has served in leadership roles in the National Medical Association (NMA) and currently she is the NMA Region 1 Trustee and the Secretary of the NMA Board of Trustees. Dr. Clare has also been an active member of American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG), serving in leadership roles on the section, district, and national levels. She currently serves as the ACOG District 2 Chair.

M. Monica Sweeney, MD, MPH

Dr. Sweeney received her medical degree from SUNY Downstate College of Medicine and a Master of Public Health degree in health services management from Columbia University's Mailman School of Public Health. She completed her residency training in internal medicine at Kings County Hospital Center/Downstate Medical Center. Dr. Sweeney served as vice dean for global engagement and clinical professor and chair of the Department of Health Policy and Management in the School of Public Health at SUNY Downstate Medical Center. Dr. Sweeney has also served as the assistant commissioner for the Bureau of HIV/AIDS and medical director and vice president for medical affairs at the Bedford Stuyvesant Family Health Center in Brooklyn. Dr. Sweeney is the immediate past chair of the SUNY Downstate Council, and served on the Presidential Advisory Council on HIV/AIDS (PACHA), and as president of the Medical Society of the County of Kings. She has served as co-chair of the Physician Advisory Council of the New York State Department of Health AIDS Institute, and as president of the Clinical Directors Network. In the fight against HIV/AIDS, Dr. Sweeney led the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene's prevention and control efforts for several years in new initiatives to control the disease globally.
